Obtaining FEMA Funding for Temporary Relocation, Repair, and Replacement of Damaged or Destroyed Facilities

Hurricanes Irma & Maria, Puerto Rico & the U.S Virgin Islands

In the wake of disasters, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) provides Public Assistance funding to health centers and other public entities to help cover the cost of relocation, emergency repair, and permanent restoration of projects. **If your health center suffered damage from Hurricane Irma or Hurricane Maria and your health center is located in Puerto Rico or the U.S. Virgin Islands, here is what you should know about FEMA's Public Assistance Program:**

The U.S. Territories of Puerto Rico and the US Virgin Islands have each been declared a Disaster Area by FEMA for both Hurricane Irma and Hurricane Maria. For reference:
